

■ The heavy rains and fires that wreaked havoc in KwaZulu-Natal and Western Cape in the recent weeks has called for a "new system" to deal with natural disasters in SA, CoGTA Minister Velenkosini Hlabisa said on Tuesday July 16. He proposed a new system for disaster management and fire services by reorganising administrative structures and financing models to better respond to growing disaster risks.

Natural disasters becoming a norm

eavy rains leading to flooding, veld fires and natural disasters are becoming a norm in South Africa. Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs (CoGTA) Minister Velenkosini Hlabisa says South Africa is at an increased risk of natural disasters and needs a "new system" to manage these challenges more effectively.

He conveyed his condolences

to the loved ones of those who have tragically lost their lives in the recent weeks.

"We also acknowledge work undertaken to rebuild our societies and we urge all government structures to increase the speed of responding to the plight of communities," Minister Hlabisa said on Tuesday during his Budget Vote Speech.

He recognised the vital role played by the department following the floods and fires currently affecting communities in KwaZu-lu-Natal (KZN) and the Western Cape.

"We have learned with heavy hearts of the passing of 14 people who died in the veld fires in KZN. Among the 14, six were firefighters, some volunteers. These brave men and women paid the ultimate price to save communities. We convey our heartfelt condolences to the loved ones of all the victims. May their souls find eternal rest," the minister said.

Minister Hlabisa tabled the CoGTA 2024/25 budget, at R395.7 billion, with a significant portion 95.9% (R379.61 billion) to be transferred to municipalities and affiliated entities.

A total of R379.6 billion of the department's total budget over the Medium-Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF) period will primarily cover the local government equitable share, disaster relief grant and the municipal infrastructure grant.

Minister Hlabisa said that it was through the department's urgent interventions that lives and livelihoods were saved and thanked all those who are collaborating with government to assist distressed communities.

The minister and his team are expected to visit the affected areas in KZN to assess the situation and provide support.

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Councillor's killer gets life sentence

The Dundee Regional Court sentenced Sihle Acute Dlamini to life imprisonment for the murder of a ward councillor in the Matshematshe area of Pomerov, south-south east of Dundee.

National Freedom Party (NFP) councillor Nompumelelo Zondi, 45, who served in the Nhlanhleni area, was shot and killed in her vehicle outside her home in March

Dlamini, 37, who fired the shot, fled the scene, and was arrested some time in 2023.

His fingerprints (found on the scene) linked him to the shooting. Upon his arrest Dlamini had made a confession, which he later retracted, said Natasha Ramkisson-Kara, regional spokesperson for the National Prosecuting Authority

"In the state's case Advocate Elvis Gcweka led the testimonies of 10 witnesses including a fellow

party member of Ms Zondi's, as well as SAPS members who visited the crime scene and took the fingerprints.

Mr Gcweka also led evidence that Zondi was killed due to tensions within the party in that area. In aggravation of sentence, Mr Gcweka led the evidence of one of Ms Zondi's family members who testified that Ms Zondi was the breadwinner for the entire family.

She also paid for the tertiary education for younger family members who have had to drop out of university due to lack of funds, following her death," said Ms Ramkisson-

In addition to the life sentence Dlamini was also declared unfit to possess a firearm. Ms Ramkisson-Kara said the NPA is satisfied with the outcome of the sentence, and they commend the successful partnership between the prosecution, the Political Killings Task Team in KwaZulu-Natal (KZN) and other

Truck theft kingpin arrested

A Zimbabwean national, believed to be the kingpin of a truck theft syndicate operating within South Africa, was arrested in an operation by private security company officers last Wednesday morning,

Spokesman for Reaction Unit South Africa (RUSA), Prem Balram said reaction officers were approached by a businessman from Shakaskraal for assistance after his truck was stolen by his employee.

"The businessman made inquiries and realised that the suspect had sought employment at various trucking companies in several provinces.

"However, after a few weeks he would disappear with the load and the mechanical horse and trailers. The suspect would allegedly then change jobs at trucking companies in other provinces to evade law enforcement," said Mr Balram.

He added that the reaction officers worked on information and gathered that the suspect was working with several foreign nationals living in South Africa.

Information received that the suspect was 34-years-old and is originally from the capital city of Harare in north east Zimbabwe, said Mr Balram.

'The suspect fled after stealing an FAW truck in

Iune 2024 in KwaZulu-Natal and was working in the Free State after relocating.

Reaction officers lured the man back to KZN and used plain clothed officers in unmarked vehicles to track him.

He was observed for several hours on Wednesday morning while waiting for positive identification. When positively identified the suspect was restrained and placed under arrest without incident," said Mr Balram.


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

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Shaping new generation of environmental champions

new initiative, the Youth Environmental Reporters and Advocates (YERA) programme, is set to empower young South Africans to investigate, document, and communicate environmental issues in their communities.

Led by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) South Africa and the Wildlife and Environment Society of South Africa (WESSA) in collaboration with the Department of Basic Education, the programme aims to build climate literacy and environmental knowledge among pupils. It also seeks to enhance their communication and reporting skills on local environmental issues.

A recent UNICEF South Africa report titled "Climate, Energy, and Environment Landscape Analysis for Children in South Africa", highlighted the need for greater visibility of young people in the climate and environment agenda to ensure policies and actions address their specific needs. "Empowering learners and young people, particularly girls, through education and nurturing their skills will build on their local knowledge to help raise their voices and strengthen action on local climate and environmental challenges," said Christine Muhigana, UNICEF South Africa Representative.

The YERA programme will provide training in investigative journalism, environmental science, and advocacy skills. The workshops will

The YERA programme will be use WESSA's Young Reporters for the Environment (YRE) methodology. One key output will be journalistic works produced by participating schools for distribution across various media platforms.

"This programme is an important step forward in further nurturing environmental awareness among learners in South Africa and we hope the programme can be expanded in the coming months and years to benefit more South African schools," said Lazi Mtwa, acting Chief Education Specialist, KZN Department of Basic Education.

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Minister proposes new system to deal with disasters

In Cape Town, over 33 000 households have been affected across the metropole in both formal and informal settings following the floods, affecting some 95 000 people.

'We recognise that the challenges we face in disaster management are largely because South Africa has experienced not only an increase in the number of disasters - such as droughts, floods, Covid-19, and severe weather - but also an increase in their magnitude, severity, and impact," the minister said. "These events have occurred either simultaneously or in rapid succession, straining our resources and systems."

However, Minister Hlabisa said he believed that the challenges faced in disaster management are primarily due to deficiencies in regulatory legislation, which are not designed to adapt to the ever-changing risk environment. He added that the systemic and structural design of disaster management delivery, as guided by current laws, results in issues with timing and bureaucracy. Key elements of the disaster management function were assigned to municipalities through legislation, but without funding. He said this created a contradiction between the Disaster Management Act and the Municipal Systems Act (MSA) which requires sufficient funding and capacity for assigned functions. Adding that municipalities lack the necessary funding and capacity.

He admitted that government's response has struggled with agility, efficiency, and effectiveness in risk analysis, prevention, mitigation, emergency preparedness, early warning systems, and recovery services.

He said the fire and rescue services also face significant hurdles and


that in 2022, Cabinet mandated the National Disaster Management Centre (NDMC) to review and overhaul the disaster management system, including fire services.

'In response to this, we are proposing a new system for disaster management and fire services. This system aims to improve governance by reorganising administrative structures and financing models to better respond to growing disaster risks," Minister Hlabisa said. "We have since developed a new model based on best practices from New Zealand, Russia, Brazil, Mozambique, California, and Australia. The new model emphasises risk reduction and integrates disaster management into all levels of government planning, ensuring adequate funding and focus

He said the NDMC undertook extensive consultations with all stakeholders through existing disaster management structures and across the three spheres of government and that inputs were received and used to refine the proposed model.

"We look forward to working with all stakeholders in the management of disasters, including rolling out training to Houses of Traditional Leadership, particularly those in disaster-prone areas, on disaster management," he said. "This will enable them to work closely with all spheres of government and stakeholders on the ground to assist in disasters. An implementation plan has been developed in this regard for effective implementation of this training."

This year, the department also signed a Memorandum of Collaboration with the Department of Defence that will see the Community Work Programme (CWP) participants playing a role in disaster preparedness and community development.



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


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The snake eggs that were found on the construction site and safely removed by snake catcher Nick Evans.



Snake catcher shares egg rescue tale

n honour of World Snake Day on Tuesday, July 16, renowned Upper Highway snake catcher Nick Evans shared how he was called to the N2/N3 Spaghetti Junction construction site after workers discovered a clutch of snake eggs. Back in March, the con-

struction team sent Evans a photograph of the eggs. The eggs, that were stuck together in a lump - a characteristic typical of snake eggs — immediately caught snakes. Evans' attention.

They looked like brown house snake eggs to me. They were laid in a safe spot, under a pipe, just beneath the surface," said Evans on Facebook.

Without delay, Evans carefully transferred the eggs into a small box filled with the sand in which they were found. He then placed the box in a warm cupboard, ensuring the eggs were in an optimal envi-

ronment for hatching. Evans was particularly amazed by the journey the female snake must have undertaken to lay her eggs in such an unusual location.

"Although house snakes are nocturnal, maybe the snake crossed at night when the roads are quieter. Or perhaps there are a few living there, breeding. I haven't had any calls from the construction team about actual snakes, so perhaps not. It was a tiny patch to live in," he said.

Evans was also surprised by the timing of the eggs, noting that most house snakes would have hatched by March. He speculated that it could have been a late clutch laid in January or possibly a second clutch from a well-fed female, given the healthy rat population in Durban that supports their diet. "I think it was the latter," said Evans.

To Evans' delight, the eggs eventually hatched, revealing they were indeed brown house snakes. "They were cute, pretty little snakes, which I

released. At their size, they'll mostly feed on lizards," Evans said.

He expressed his gratitude towards the construction team for their concern and efforts to ensure the eggs were safely removed.

"A big thank you to the con-struction team for caring enough to call to have the eggs removed safely. I'm extremely grateful to them," he said.

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Yellow-bellied snakes released out at sea

Two adult yellow-bellied sea snakes that have spent the past two weeks in the care of the uShaka Sea World herpetologists were released out at sea this month.

The highly venomous snakes were released 20 nautical miles out at sea after they were deemed to have recovered sufficiently.

The snakes were originally stranded on beaches in the Western Cape at Natures Valley and Lookout Beach. They were initially cared for by local snake rescuer Tiago Rebelo before being flown to uShaka Sea World.

uShaka Sea World senior herpetologist, Carl Schloms said yellow-bellied sea snakes spend their lives drifting on the surface of the water, feeding on surface pelagic fish and drifter fish, that are usually found in association with floating

'Although we are not certain why these incredibly beautiful snakes washed up on the beach, it is possible that the rough weather conditions in the area around the time of their stranding

would have played a role," he said. The yellow-bellied sea snake is one of the most widely distributed snakes in the world, occurring in every ocean except the Atlantic. Their distribution does, however, favour warmer waters. The best second chance we could give these two fortunate sea snakes was to release them into the warm Agulhas

current off Durban.

"If you come across a sea snake, it is important that you do not attempt to put it back in the sea, but rather contact wildlife authorities or snake experts as they are highly venomous. You will notice (in the picture) I was wearing bite proof gloves when I released the snakes," said uShaka Sea World Senior Herpetologist, Carl Schloms.



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Premier's office warns of fake job vacancies

¬he KwaZulu-Natal Premier's Office has issued a warning to the public regarding fraudulent job vacancies circulating on social media.

În a recent media statement, the office said some references in these bogus advertisements were taken from a previous, legitimate recruitment drive.

These job advertisements, upon close examination, mirror the references and appearance of those originally issued by the KwaZulu-Natal Provincial Government in August 2023 under the Sthesha Waya-Waya Provincial recruitment drive. Those advertisements have closed, and the recruitment processes have been concluded. They are not being re-advertised," the statement clarified.

The Premier's Office said all authentic and approved provincial government vacancies are only advertised through the official provincial government e-recruitment system or on the respective department's websites. They cautioned the public to be vigilant and avoid interacting with these fraudulent posts.

"At this juncture, the Office

of the Premier categorically states that these social media advertisements are not sanctioned by the KwaZulu-Natal Provincial Government and are the work of unscrupulous and mischievous individuals seeking to exploit the aspirations of honest South Africans who are diligently searching for employment or considering career changes," the statement continued.

The statement said "the warning comes in light of a surge in deceptive job postings designed to lure unsuspecting job seekers".

The Premier's Office has urged citizens to exercise extreme caution and discernment when applying for any vacancies. They advised that all job seekers should verify the legitimacy of iob advertisements by consulting the official provincial government e-recruitment system or departmental websites.

The office also reminded the public that the Sthesha Waya-. Waya Provincial recruitment drive, which took place in August 2023, had already concluded. Any job advertisements referencing this drive were outdated and should be disregarded.

As part of their efforts to combat these fraudulent activities, the Premier's Office is working closely with social media platforms and other relevant authorities to identify and remove fake job posts. They are also exploring legal avenues to hold those responsible for these scams accountable.

The Premier's Office reiterated its commitment to transparent and fair recruitment processes and reassured the public that genuine job opportunities would always be communicated through official channels. They urged anyone who encountered suspicious job advertisements to report them to the relevant authorities immediately.

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Dr Mkhwanazi graduates as top surgery registrar

r Nsizwenye Mkhwanazi has made history by graduating as the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa's (CMSA) top surgery registrar (specialist in training) as well as becoming the first black African candidate to receive the Douglas Award for Fellowship of the College of Surgeons of South Africa (CS CMSA).

The former president of the Medical School Student Representative Council (MSRC) at the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN), Dr Mkhwanazi has made his dream of a becoming a doctor a reality.

The CMSÁ fellowship involves being part of a professional body dedicated to promoting the highest degree of skill and efficiency in medical practice and cultivating the highest ethical standards and professional conduct, not for financial gain but for the betterment of humanity, said Dr Mkhwanazi

"This goes down as one of the proudest moments of my life. I am especially grateful to all my teachers, especially CS CMSA president, Professor Zach Koto," he said.

Dr Mkhwanazi said he was the first medical doctor in his family. He was born into a disadvantaged family in the Mpumalanga province. He chose to overcome poverty by studying to become a doctor with a mission to save the lives of others.

"In medicine, you get to directly impact people's lives. You have an opportunity to not only touch the physical being but also the soul," he said. "If God allows, the decisions we make echo into eternity. We ease the pain; we prevent catastrophe and I find that quite fulfilling."

Dr Mkhwanazi said he fell in love with surgery while doing his internship and instantaneously wanted to be excellent at it. He said he realised that he needed to become the very best at what he does, and that required him putting in the hard work. He said he has been inspired by many of his colleagues and mentors who saw potential in him and always encouraged him to work hard.

Dr Mkhwanazi is currently working at Cape Town's Groote Schuur Hospital, where he is doing his fellowship (subspecialisation) in colorectal surgery which entails a wide range of surgical procedures to

counteract conditions affecting the lower digestive tract. His ongoing Master of Medicine degree focuses on peripheral arterial disease for which he is being supervised by Sefako Makgatho and Health Sciences university vascular surgeon, Dr Siphumelele Ngema, where Dr Mkhwanazi served as a registrar.

"I am pursuing colorectal surgery as a speciality because the disease is a significant burden in the country which needs to be better understood. I am interested in minimally-invasive techniques in colorectal cancer treatment and also can't wait to see where the tide of genomics, personalised cancer care and targeted therapies lead us," said Dr Mkhwanazi.

He added that being involved in student leadership influenced his future path. There was a lot of naivety entering into it but he said he grew up so fast through that experience. Adding that he was quite passionate about improving the lives of the students on campus.

Dr Mkhwanazi and his peers founded the MSRC book loan scheme with the help of UKZN's former Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Teaching and Learning, Professor Renuka Vithal.

"Being elected MSRC president at 19 years old, while in my third year, was scary but definitely one of my Medical School highlights. Holding insightful conversations with UKZN leadership cultivated my

confidence going into practice and becoming a registrar," he said.

When he's not studying or working, Dr Mkhwanazi said he loves going to church regularly, it helps reset his spiritual compass. He also loves being in nature, he said it gets his mind thinking at a different level.

"My mom has always been my inspiration while my dad supported me as a young pupil in high school and through varsity. My wife has been my rock – she encourages me to take time off and think about things outside of work. They have been my driving force and my encouragement for achieving all I have achieved in my life so far," he said.

Composer goes back to musical roots

Renowned South African pianist and composer Sibusiso Mash Mashiloane embarks on a journey to his artistic musical roots with a special *Izibongo* concert in Durban.

The performance will take place on Wednesday July 31 at the Centre for Jazz at the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN). It reunites Mashiloane with the very band that brought his critically acclaimed album, *Izibongo*, to life.

Mashiloane is recognised as an authority on South African music, specifically jazz. He is a prolific artist and has released an album every year since 2016, garnering numerous awards and nominations.

His collaborations with top South African musicians span a decade, and his performances have captivated audiences worldwide, including getting the recent honour to compose a suite titled *Isigqi* for Carnegie Hall's National Youth Orchestra.

Izibongo is a powerful exploration that seamlessly blends traditional South African instruments with piano, saxophone, double bass, percussion, and drums.

Drawing on his cultural roots and the wisdom of his ancestors, Mashiloane creates a tapestry of sound that celebrates African musical traditions. The album's title is derived from the instructive Bantu verb "bonga," which


signifies giving thanks, Mashiloane said.

Mashiloane' band features Sisonke Xonti on tenor saxophone, Kagiso Ramela on alto saxophone, Dalisu Ndlazi on double bass, Tlale Makhene on percussion, and Siphelelo Mazibuko on drums.

"My composition alchoices for Izibongo were informed by traditional teachings that emphasise the use of music to convey symbolic and cultural meanings. The extended musical pieces, such as the 15-minute Ntate Mashiloane, eschew traditional genres and embrace a 'prayer mode' of improvisation, filled with honest and transcendent spiritual experiences. Izibongo is a testament to the power of music as a generational, shared experience, fostering a sense of communication, belonging, and appreciation for the geographical essence of music," Mashiloane said.

The performance will be on Wednesday July 31 at the Centre for Jazz and Popular Music at UKZN. Tickets cost R120 or R90 for pensioners, and R60 for students.

Crooked Seeds Karen Jennings Karavan Press Review: Karen Watkins

We learn from an early age to be considerate to people with disabilities, however, when it comes to the heroine in this novel, it's challenging.

Deidre van Deventer is a revolting character: a middle-aged, single, childless, bitter woman. She uses people wherever she can: a cigarette here, a drink or two there, even the kindness of her neighbour.


The story begins with Deidre waking up to crouch over a mixing bowl by her bed to pee. The action is painful because she only has one leg. She is aware of the smell of her three-day-old underwear. She doesn't care. All she wants is to quench her thirst. She's so thirsty she cannot fit her false teeth into her dry mouth.

The story is set in the near future and Cape Town is living under drought conditions. This is possibly why Deidre is not washing and being selfish about using money sent by her estranged daughter, not for water but for "takeaways and booze".

With no water in her dilapidated apartment, she drinks a jar of pickle brine and eats some dangerously old Vienna sausages.

Surrounded by the pain of others, her cry is: "What about me?" When challenged about her behaviour – "It's just the way I am" – and asked why she doesn't help others, her response is: "Why would I help anyone else? I'm the one that needs help. Me. Look at me. I'm the one!"

In a sense she is right.



Deidre is, in her own words, a "cripple", having lost one leg in an explosion when she was 18. How that happened is unclear.

Author Karen Jennings expertly releases information as she delves into a sub-plot where Deidre receives a call from the police. The remains of several small bodies have been unearthed from her family's former home, after decades underground.

Her other characters are fabulous. Deidre's mother, Trudy, worships Ross, the prodigal son of the family, "a dickhead" in Deidre's estimation.

Without giving away too much, this is not a feel-good book but it did make me feel good. The story does have very dark humour that surfaces with perfect timing.

It is no wonder that Jennings was deservedly long-listed for the Booker prize for *The Island* in 2021. She is a master at writing with compassion and honesty about broken people. And this book is highly recommended.



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


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
Reviews: Lauren O'Connor-May **Everybody Toots** Jonny Leighton, Illustrated by Mike Byrne **Buster Books**

Comrades race and operations manager, Ann Ashworth has resigned.

Comrades race and operations manager resigns

The Comrades Marathon Association (CMA) has been rocked by the unexpected resignation of its race and operations manager, Ann Ashworth.

The announcement has sent shockwaves through the road running community.

Ashworth's resignation was publicly announced on her Facebook page on Thursday, prompting a flood of comments and reactions from her followers.

"My time at the CMA has come to an end. The Board feels that I lack the necessary leadership and race management abilities to continue to serve as the Race and Operations Manager," wrote Ashworth.

She said the Board had initially extended her contract but later decided to revoke the offer. She mentioned that she had previously indicated her desire not to remain in her position beyond June 30.

Ashworth shared her perspective on the situation, stating, "I had offered to resign on at least three occasions, but this offer was never accepted. I was hesitant to stay on at the CMA given what was happening in the office and behind closed doors. I was convinced to sign my offer of extension after discussing matters with my staff and Tier 1 sponsors who wished me to remain in my position."

Despite her dedication and hard work, she said, she had expressed a sense of disillusionment.

"Regardless, and in spite of all my sacrifices and the dedication I have shown to the race for yet another year, I have once again been humbled. I have taken myself to the brink, worked myself to the bone; and I have no medal to show for it. That's life," she said.

The Provincial Athletics governing body, KwaZulu-Natal Athletics (KZNA), and the CMA confirmed Ashworth's resignation.

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
